Sacrament Information

Infant Baptism: A preparation program for parents and godparents is required. Once paperwork is submitted, we will register you for preparation and schedule the date for Baptism.

First Reconciliation & First Eucharist: Customarily the reception of these sacraments takes place during 2nd grade. The child will need to have completed one year of religious education the year immediately prior to sacramental preparation and will continue in religious education concurrent with the preparation classes.

Confirmation: Candidates must be in the 9th grade or above to be confirmed. The candidate will need to have completed one year of youth group the year immediately prior to Confirmation preparation. They will also need to attend youth group the year of preparation. Preparation for adult Confirmation takes place in April. Confirmation will take place in May.

Marriage: Please call the Parish Office at least six months in advance to begin the preparation process. You will set the date for the wedding at the first meeting.

Anointing of the Sick: Please contact the parish office to arrange visitation and sacraments. You may leave a message any time of day or night and someone will get back to you as soon as possible.

Dear Parishioners,

Sex Abuse Update: It is the intention of the Archdiocese to relate important information with you regarding sexual abuse. As your pastor I have a role in this, and so I want to draw your attention to some recent developments regarding abuse and settled lawsuits.

The first thing I want to share is that the Archdiocese website, Protect and Heal, (https://protect-seattlearchdiocese.org/) has been updated with some important data. If you go to the website and scroll down you will notice a chart that says, "Total Settlements and Reported Abuse Case Payouts." This chart shows the amount of legal settlements and how much the Archdiocese paid by year.

You will notice that in 2012, for example, there were only a couple of settlements that paid out a million or so. On the other hand, in 2014 you will see that there were almost 40 settlements that paid out almost \$14 million. Note that these instances of abuse did not occur these years. These settlements were for cases decades ago.

Recently, there have been a few more settlements that have occurred. One is for a priest named Dennis Champagne. Champagne served mostly in Snohomish county and the payout from his cases are \$1.7 million. The other recent notable case did not involve a priest. It involved a volunteer who served as a coach in Bellevue and Kirkland for the Catholic Youth Organization. Settlements for his abuse are about \$250,000.

When a settlement like this occurs, the Archdiocese always issues a press release to local media in Seattle. For that reason, if you have any questions about these cases I ask that you look online for information first.

As always, please keep all of those who have been hurt by the Church or who have had their faith shaken by these sad instances of abuse in your prayers. I also want to continue to encourage you to attend our Archdiocese safe environment class. In fact, I recently spoke to a man who is not even Catholic who took our class and he remarked that it was the best he's ever taken. Taking the class will help you to protect children, both inside out outside of our parishes.

Movie Review, 1917: On a completely different note, I went and saw the movie 1917 and I enjoyed it a lot. In terms of the story, it was what I like. It was fairly simple. It was about two young, courageous soldiers in World War One trying to move through enemy territory to their allies to warn them not to attack.

You see, on one of the battle fronts, the Germans suddenly retreated acting like they were being defeated by the British. This wasn't the case, however. They fell back wanting their enemies to follow them, because they had an ambush set up. Had this been successful, the British would have lost 1600 men, thus the mission to call off the attack. It was very exciting.

In terms of style, it was one of the most unique films I have ever seen. It was filmed like it was all one long camera shot. If you look closely you can see little breaks (like when a rock passes between the camera and the actors) but it looks like one long take. I was worried this would be distracting, but it really wasn't. I enjoyed it and I do recommend it. Out of the movies I've seen that have been nominated for Best Picture, 1917 and A Beautiful Day in the Neighborhood (The Mr. Rogers Movie) are my favorites.



Gospel Meditation - Encourage Deeper Understanding Of Scripture

"Now, Master, you may let your servant go in peace, according to your word, for my eyes have seen your salvation, which you prepared in the sight of all the peoples: a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and glory for your people Israel." Very often, having more light is not something we desire as it forces us to confront something we really do not want to see. There can be comfort found in darkness. It has an eerie sense of security to it. We do not have to challenge ourselves or be challenged and can simply exist in some fabricated state of self-fabricated blissfulness. Jesus came to bring light, and it is a light that is resisted by many and hated by some. It is a light that causes us to see things as they really are and not as we would want or need them to be.

It is no wonder then that Simeon boldly and honestly proclaims to Mary, "Behold, this child is destined for the fall and rise of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be contradicted and you yourself a sword will pierce so that the thoughts of many hearts may be revealed." We have to take the Gospel message as it is and not just use those parts that are useful to us or more palatable. Taking Jesus at face value can and will lead to turmoil and dissention. Hearts will be pierced. Whether we like it, Jesus' proclamation of what the world God created really ought to look like has real and absolute social implications.

It has a lot to say about how we treat our brothers and sisters: spiritually, personally, economically, and globally. It has everything to do with the poor, the immigrant, the scared, the unborn, the vulnerable, the sick, and the broken. The light opens us to a challenging, table-turning experience that may not be something we want to see but shows us where we need to be.
